Hastings - concept Much of the 20 acres of Isham Park will be used as the performers begin dispersed throughout the park. Slowly, over the course of the 30 minute performance, they will come together in small groups and then finally into a complete ensemble, a visual and aural harmony. The audience should feel free to walk around, sit, or spread out a blanket and listen to the performance.

The performance is centered around the mythic persona of radical abolitionist John Brown. On the night of October 16, 1859, Brown and his followers assaulted the U.S. Arsenal at Harper's Ferry, planning to use the captured arms in a campaign for the liberation of the slaves in the South. He was later hanged for his crime. This action came to be seen as a precursor to the Civil War. John Brown's favorite hymn, "Blow, Ye The Trumpets, Blow!", as well as the Civil War era march "John Brown's Body" (also know as "The Battle Hymn of the Republic") will be used as centering devices for the performance, reference points used to construct the harmonic and melodic content of the musical work, though abstracted and reconfigured. The title Cloudsplitter (taken from Russell Bank's novel about John Brown) alludes to the highest point in New York State (Mt. Marcy) also known as Tahawus, a word some translate as "Cloudsplitter." The Brown farmstead, and his final resting place, lie in a valley near Mt. Marcy, close to Lake Placid, NY.
